TRUMP THREATENS IRAN'S OIL & POWER SITES

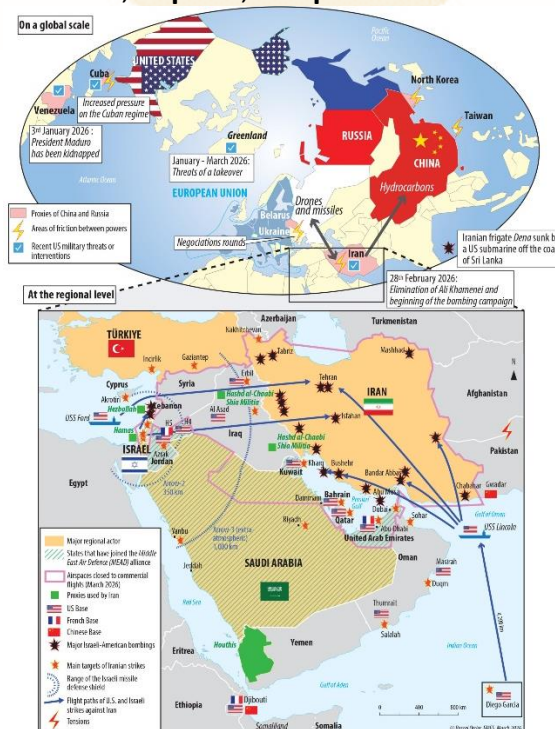


INTRODUCTION: A CRISIS AT THE HEART OF GLOBAL STABILITY

Trump's ultimatum—demanding reopening of the strait—comes amid fears that its closure could trigger a global energy crisis.

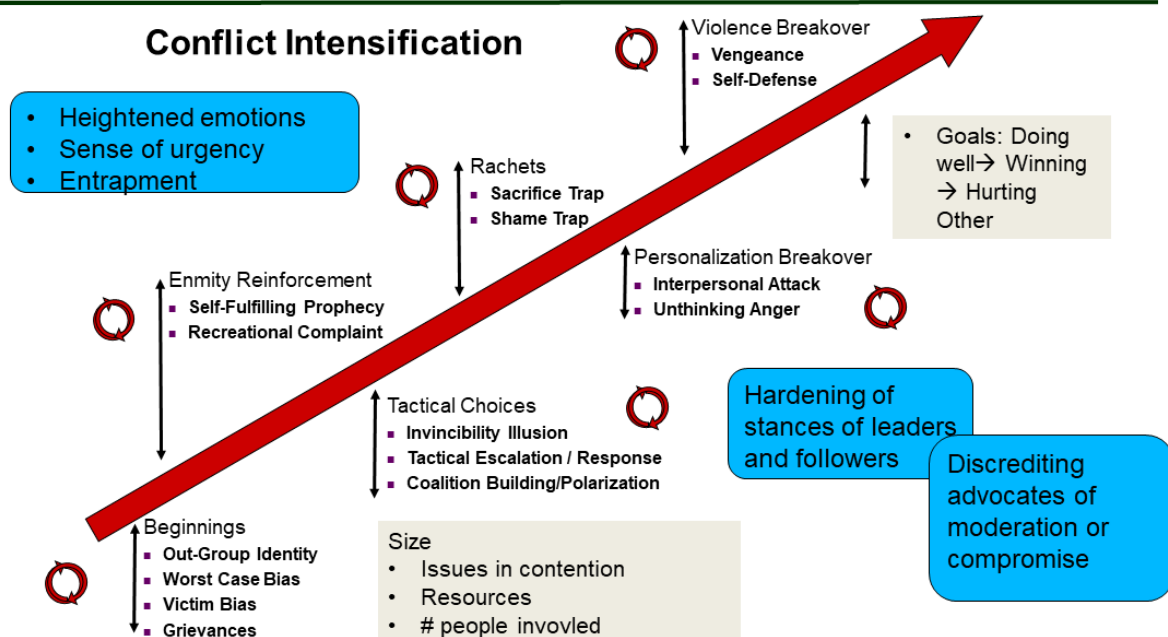
3. The Centrality of Energy Infrastructure
